# Christmas 2022 Food Bank & Gift Drive

December 6, 10:39 a.m. – an email arrives in my inbox from a contact at Calgary Housing:

"Hello Kerry, I have encountered a couple of families that could really use food and/or Christmas gifts. I know it's too late right now, but I thought I'd send an email to check if there is anything left over for these families. Felt it was worth a shot."

Panic sets in, as the deadline for applications was November 25, and all the food shopping, gift shopping, and pre-ordering of perishable food items has been

completed. But how do you say no to two more families in need? Hmmm....

About two hours later, a text arrives from a friend:

"Don't know why I didn't think of this sooner!! I have a bunch of unopened toys I'm looking to donate – the girls have now outgrown this stuff and it's never been opened!... your church probably has a good use for them this holiday season, no?"

Is that not answered prayer and God at work?
But wait, there's more...

An Oak Park volunteer went out early one Saturday morning to purchase the non-perishable items for the last-minute additional Food Bank family. It wasn't until she had scanned all the items at the self check-out





that she realized she had left her wallet at home! The cashier supervisor was reluctant to hold all her items while she went home to get her wallet. Hearing this, a

gentleman at the next till came over and offered to pay for the groceries. After a brief back-and-forth discussion, she finally agreed to let him pay.

Feeling compelled to explain further, she told him the food was not actually for her, but for a family that her church was supporting through a Food Bank - a mom and two kids from a domestic violence situation. The gentleman then tells her that he is a retired police officer who spent most of his career working in the domestic violence unit!

He was delighted to hear what the groceries were for, his generosity took care of our last-minute recipients, and our

shopper was saved from an embarrassing situation.

So many people were involved in making the Christmas 2022 Food Bank and Gift Drive such a success – the many faithful volunteers making reminder calls, donating money, donating shopping

All of this during the worst possible weather conditions (remember the -40°s?) and not a single volunteer failed to show up because of it.

With everyone pitching in, we held the biggest donation event in the history of the Oak Park Church Food Bank & Gift Drive,

providing two weeks' worth of groceries and a complete Christmas meal to 32 families, and gifts for every member of the family for 36 families. The combined efforts

of Oak Park, Hope for Life, and Campbell-Stone United Church made this happen, so a huge thank-you to all who participated. And a big thank-you to the staff who let us stash items all over the church.

Incredibly, our food shoppers were able to bring us in below budget. These bargain hunters and fierce negotiators were able to source everything on the massive shopping list (and then some) – an amazing feat.

By bringing us in so far under projected spending, we have a head start on fundraising for the Easter Food Bank.

Thank you so much for the continued support and enthusiasm for the Oak Park Food Bank and Gift Drive – it wouldn't happen without all those "hands and feet" of God.

## **Ash Wednesday**

Do not avoid difficult truths and do not sugar-coat life's realities. You and I will die. It may not be something we like to bring up in a casual conversation with an acquaintance, but deep down we all know it is true. Amidst all the big and meaningful topics that the church engages with, death is not often front and centre; like in broader culture, death can feel a bit like a hush-hush topic within the church as well. Even the contemporary rebranding of a "Funeral Service" to the more upbeat name, "Celebration of Life," is a telling sign.

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the season of Lent - the 40-day journey to the empty tomb on Easter Sunday. This year at Oak Park, we will be having an Ash Wednesday service (February 22), to mark the beginning of this season. There will be prayer, Scripture, and the imposition of ashes (where a cross is marked on your forehead with ash). It will be a service where talk of death is not avoided and our mortality is marked by a communal confession that we are not our own, but we belong to the eternal one.

I love what Tish Harrison Warren has to say about the reality of Ash Wednesday: "But the truly countercultural message of Ash Wednesday is not that we will die. It's that though death awaits us, despair is not inevitable. By naming the stark, intractable horror of death, we as a church—without triteness or saccharine denial—can proclaim true hope in the midst of it."

# **Oak Park Missions Update**

#### **Refuge of Hope Internation**

Christmas was filled with a wide range of emotions at Refuge of Hope in the Philippines. There was plenty of joy that went along with the fun parties, food, silly games, and gifts, but also sadness for the girls as they continue to miss their families. It was such good news to hear that the gifts purchased by Oak Park arrived December 23<sup>rd</sup>!

The girls have been enjoying some special times roasting hot dogs, playing games and gardening at the new property, the 'promised land' as they call it. The posts and roof for the administration building are now up, providing a covered place for them to gather at the property. There are now 14 girls at Refuge of Hope, most of whom have made the decision to follow Jesus – such radical transformation in their emotions and character from anger, bitterness, and defiance to kindness and confidence.

Refuge of Hope is currently focused on fundraising for a van and the new housing unit. The costs of caring for the girls on a day-to-day basis can be broken down as follows:

\$7 = drinking water for a week or one meal for the whole household

\$9 = a medical or dental check-up

\$15 = the girls' school allowance for a week

\$18 = one bag of rice (Filipinos eat rice three times a day)

\$21 = transport to school for a week

\$87 = the electric bill every month



#### **Pioneer Bible Translators**

Norm has spent the last few months in Dallas, Texas, where he was able to complete the next step of translation checks on the Akukem book of Mark. Eight different reading clubs have been taking place back in the Akukem villages to try to improve the peoples' literacy so that they will be able to read their Bibles when they are printed. Over 900 literacy shell books (cultural storybooks and short Bible storybooks) were printed for these classes, and they were very enthusiastically received. What an exciting time of preparation and anticipation!

Norm has now returned to Calgary to spend a few weeks with his family before he and Jill fly to Papua New Guinea on February 12 to do the final check on this translation of the book of Luke before it gets sent for printing. They will be visiting us at Oak Park Church on February 5, and we hope you will join us as we take the opportunity to pray for them before they once again head overseas.



## **Long Range Planning Committee and Construction**

The expansion and renovation redesign to bring costs down was completed last fall and a revised development permit submitted to and approved by the City of Calgary. Revised drawings were included in the Park Bench last fall and are posted on the foyer wall. Copies are also available from the church office. The construction general contractor, Milestone, has been selected and approved by the Board. Milestone has been working with us and our architect as we finalize detailed engineering and prepare detailed construction drawings to be submitted to the City for a Building Permit later this winter. We anticipate construction starting in April and taking 6 to 8 months to complete.

We are also currently working with the Church of Christ Development Corporation for a low-interest, long-term loan for the portion of the project that will be financed. They have told us they anticipate no issues approving our application and will formally start that application once the church's congregation has formally approved the project. The Board is preparing the proposal to commit to the project that will be presented and voted on at the special congregational meeting on February 12.

As folks heard at the service on January 22, we received approval from the Government of Alberta's Community Facilities Enhancement Program (CFEP) for a grant of \$1 million on January 16. What an answer to prayer that we should celebrate and be grateful for! This is a matching grant, meaning the government will contribute up to \$1 million towards the first \$2 million of the project's costs. It is unusual for a church to receive such a large amount – it is Oak Park's many community-focused missions that attracted CFEP's attention and approval. The balance of the project costs will be met by the pledge campaign from church donors (Infinitely More) and a loan from the CCDC as noted above. The greater the congregational donations to the project, the lower the loan will be.

Additional project information will be provided by the Board ahead of the upcoming congregational approval meeting. In the meantime, Lane and I are always available for any questions you might have.
