

Roles while away from Haiti

Have you ever heard the statement, 'time flies?' It seems as if it was yesterday the elders of Oak Park laid hands on my wife and I as we left to serve in Haiti as Oak Park's missionaries – that was 16 years ago.

So much has happened and changed since; we were newlywed then, now we are parents to four children including a teenager. We planted two churches and oversaw a total of five churches, two schools, and an agricultural program. Our time in Haiti was marked by two catastrophic earthquakes, killer hurricanes and countless political upheavals including a presidential assassination.

In September of 2024, through prayer and great council, we concluded that it was time to leave Haiti, and we relocated here in Calgary. We physically left the island but remain deeply involved while here in Canada. Instead of being on the frontline evangelizing, mentoring and initiating different activities, now my new role in donor relations is to be a voice for our faithful leaders on the ground. Our responsibilities haven't changed despite our change of location; we still have many employed staff and ongoing projects so I focus on fundraising activities, building regular partnerships, and gathering necessary resources so they can continue to do the job. A grave misunderstanding is that since we are not in Haiti, the ministry no longer needs supporters – in fact it is quite the opposite. Our faithful leaders are living through one of the darkest times Haiti has ever experienced and need all our help, prayerfully and financially. It is hard to read about their regular challenges in a gang-controlled society. It is equally hard not to feel guilty that we are comfortable here in North America saying that 'we'll pray for you.' We will never stop praying for them and we are motivated more than ever to be their voices as they carry the torch forward while sharing the gospel.

Despite the challenges, Haiti is a better place because Oak Park initiated this project 16 years ago that is changing lives for this generation and for many generations to come. Haiti is grateful to Oak Park and hopefully when things calm down, you will be able to visit the saints there again. At this point, North America has suspended all international flights to Haiti as the main airport is not safe due to the gangs in the surrounding area. When flights resume, I will hopefully be on one of the first planes back, to encourage our leaders in person.

Lifeline's Ministry and Meal Packing Events

One of the most impactful aspects of Lifeline's ministry is its **meal packing events**, which serve to mobilize people to join in God's mission and address hunger and nutrition deficiencies in areas of crisis and impoverishment.

Our meal packing events have been growing here in the Calgary region. We're partnering with churches, schools, youth groups, and businesses. Each event is characterized by a spirit of camaraderie and a shared commitment to making a tangible difference in the lives of those less fortunate. Participants often express a deep sense of fulfillment and connection, knowing that their efforts contribute to alleviating hunger. This fall Lifeline Canada is participating in the Million Meal Tour which features larger meal packing events at each of Lifeline's Meal Pack Centres across North America. Our goal for that event is to pack at least 50,000 meals with Calgary businesses!

These events not only provide immediate relief but also inspire sustainable change. The meals packed are distributed to communities where food insecurity is rampant. Our latest shipment of meals was sent to an indigenous community near Yellowknife which had been evacuated twice last summer due to forest fires and suffered a flood in the same time period.

In addition to meal packing, Lifeline's ministry encompasses various programs that focus on working with local churches to transform communities with the Gospel, provide educational opportunities for youth, and stimulate economic empowerment. We're committed to mobilizing everyone, everywhere, to join the mission of God, whether by participating in a meal packing event or joining a mission trip opportunity.

WHAT IS THE GOOD LIFE?



Scroll through your phone, watch a movie, or talk to your financial advisor, and you will find a wide range of answers to that question. More money. More comfort. More pleasure. A life without pain. A bigger home. The perfect relationship. Our world

is constantly offering us its version of the good life.

But what if the good life is something entirely different?

This summer at Oak Park, we'll be exploring the Beatitudes of Jesus – eight surprising statements he makes at the beginning of his most famous message, the Sermon on the Mount. Each of these begins with the word "Blessed," which can also mean happy or fortunate. In other words, Jesus is giving us his vision of what the good life really is.

At first glance though, his list seems upside-down:

Blessed are the poor?

Blessed are those who mourn?

How can those things possibly lead to happiness?

If we're honest, these are experiences we prefer to avoid. They sound more like obstacles to the good life, not the path to it. But Jesus is doing something very intentional. He isn't offering self-help tips or motivational advice; he's inviting us into a whole new way of being.

Jesus didn't just come to bring a message; he came to bring a kingdom. And the way of his kingdom looks radically different from the values of the world around us. In God's kingdom, it is often in the unexpected places like meekness, mercy, and purity, that we begin to understand what it means to truly live.

This isn't an easy path. But it is the one that leads to life as God designed it. The Beatitudes are not just poetic sayings. They are an invitation into a life of deep transformation, into becoming the people God created us to be.

Join us this summer as we discover *The Good Life* – as defined by Jesus himself.

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.

Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.

Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy.

Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
