In Battle

As flawed human beings we are all susceptible to

the lies of the accuser. Sometimes he is blatant in his deceptions, grandiose allegations that fly in the face of God's Word in such an obvious way that they cannot be mistaken for anything but lies. With the prominence of the horror entertainment phenomenon in our culture it's easy to imagine the devil as a cloven hoofed monster. lurking in the shadows and waiting to latch on to his prey and drag them down to the fiery pit. My own experience as a Christian has been a much more subtle, quiet battle. 1 Peter 5:8 tells us that our enemy "prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour". Without a doubt, by the time the enemy roars he has been prowling for a while. In recent weeks I have been identifying some lies and false beliefs that have been so expertly woven into the fabric of my life that I didn't notice their arrival or presence. The enemy had been prowling for years, placing

mines at the borders of my mind, subtly wrapping barbed wire around my heart, dosing the waters of my soul with bitter liquid one drop at a time. Life is busy, I have three kids at different stages of development, one with special needs. I have a job, I have animals, I have friends who need help with various things. As long as life remained busy enough to distract me from God, as long as I was so entrenched in my life that I stopped listening for His soft voice, the enemy's prowling went unnoticed.

At some point God nudged me and reminded me that I was neglecting to balance my spiritual life. I repented and started making a concentrated effort to get back to church and start reading scripture again. Perimeter alarms blared. Strobe lights and sirens screamed to life. The enemy started to roar.

When we begin to inch closer to where God wants us to be, the enemy gets angry. He knows the battle has been won, but (cont'd on page 3)

I believe that the enemy knows full well that Christians are more likely to feel defeated when they are subjected to those quiet battles. The nagging voice that tells you, "stop talking, you're being annoying". The rasping whisper, "you will never be as good as they are. Why even try?" The seething snarl, "you don't deserve God's grace, what have you done to deserve His favor?" Intellectually we understand that God is patient, loving, and abounding in endless grace. We know that He doesn't require perfection and that He has created us knowing full well that we are fallible and will sin. Intellect can be strangled by emotion.

The good news is that when the enemy roars, when his traps are tripped and his sirens scream, God remains firm and steadfast amidst the chaos. When we reach for His outstretched hand and ask Him to show us the truth, He embraces us and reveals it. Patiently and lovingly He will silence the beast, remove the mines and discard the barbed wire. More good news is that He has created not one of us, but a family of us. Society tells us that we should strive to power through alone. Grown ups don't cry. What doesn't kill you makes you stronger. Get over it and get on with it. But God created us to be in fellowship together, to strengthen and sharpen each other - that is what the church is intended to be and do.

So be watchful and alert. The enemy may prowl through your life and leave his traps and tricks but the fortress built and fortified by Christ Himself surrounded by guards of love, fellowship, and communion will stand victorious.

things you may not know about the Oak Park Food Bank

We're excited to announce that the next Food Bank event is coming up on **April 5** and **6**, here at Oak Park. Here's a few things you might not know about this ministry:

1: Families from near and far

We serve families from our church and neighbouring communities.

Their names are provided by our church staff and by Calgary Housing, who are in direct contact with those most in need. Some are local Calgarians; others are new immigrants from various cultures, backgrounds, and religions.

2: No canned fruit/veg please

It may seem like a great item to donate, but feedback from the recipients indicates that these items are not as popular. Folks from other countries and cultures may not be familiar with food in this format and can

be wary – even suspicious – of what is in that can. A list of items that are most appreciated is available at the Information Centre.

3: This is NOT the Calgary Interfaith Food Bank

Oak Park Church Food Bank is entirely self-sufficient and independent. It operates solely on the basis of donations of non-perishable food and money from our church congregation.

4: Funds for fresh food

We're pleased to be able to provide our clients with a variety of high-quality fresh food items to go along with non-perishable goods. Fruit, vegetables, milk, eggs, beef, turkey – all of these are made possible by your monetary donations, designated for the Food Bank on your offering envelopes.



5: The world may hate plastic bags, but we love them!

It's not that we are trying to destroy the environment, but when

we give away as much food as we do... On average, we use between 350-400 plastic grocery bags at each event. If you have any that you want to get rid of guilt-free and put to good use, bring them to us!

6: Not just food at the Food Bank

We encourage our clients to pick up their food from the church so they can stop and enjoy a coffee and a chat, help themselves to Doris' clothing racks, and take away any of the donated household items we have to offer.

7: Many hands

Dozens of our church members (from ages 3 up to ??) participate in the packing of the non-perishable goods on Sunday after church, and sorting and packing perishable goods on Monday afternoon. Come join the fun – no experience necessary!

– all are essential roles to
make the OPC Food Bank a


Update on Oak Park Missions

Vienna has moved to her new location, Tabuk where she will open a shelter in June for abused women and children. The shelter is presently under construction. The shelter is attached to a local church whose pastor and wife have dreamed of this project for years. The pastor's wife is a social worker and she will team with Vienna and her friend Elnora to provide safety, shelter, education

and hope. This is such amazing, rapid progress but we know God has gone before putting all the 'pieces' together. Let's keep Vienna in our prayers that God would protect, guide, and help her work out all the details.



Financial Update - What is the Benevolence Fund?

Over the next few Park Bench issues I will explain the purpose and use of the different funds that you can donate to at Oak Park. The **Benevolence Fund** is a long-standing practice at Oak Park of collecting designated gifts (meaning you must specify or indicate on the envelope that the money is for our Benevolence Fund) for the purpose of providing a helping hand to those in acute need. At its most basic, the fund works to uphold James 2:15-17: "Suppose a brother or sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, 'Go in peace; keep warm and well fed,' but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead."

The Benevolence Fund works by taking requests through Pastor Martin who then passes the requests on to a small committee of congregation members (including Board and Elder representatives) who then prayerfully consider the need. Requests include essential things like utilities, rent, mortgage payment, groceries as well as special requests for expenses that are simply not able to be met. It is important to note that requests come from within our church family and also from the wider community. While it is always tempting to restrict the Fund to only those within our church family, we must be obedient to the radical call of the Scriptures to care for those who have no worldly status (see 1 John 3:17-18; Galatians 2:10; Romans 12:20; Acts 9:36). This is also a powerful witness to our community that we exist for them and not just ourselves. Part of our vetting process with requests from those outside our church family is aided by the support of Calgary Housing, Patch Services, and SWCRC. We wish we could meet and cover every request, but unfortunately, we are limited in how much we can help by the balance of our Benevolence Fund.

If you have any questions about Oak Park's Benevolence Fund, please feel free to talk to either Pastor Martin or Pastor Lane. Thank you for so generously continuing to support this Fund that is so central to our mission and calling as a church family.
