About 80 of us gathered for a delicious roast beef dinner, highlighted by an entertaining talk on "Time" complete with "Beat the Clock!" by Pastor cum game-show-host Lane Scruggs. ("How many needles can you thread in 60 seconds?") It was the first time seven attendees had ever been to Oak Park, guests of regulars.

The Oak Park Seniors Ministry has enjoyed sustained success for many years. Since 2013 it has been spear headed by Doris MacKinnon, whose vision is for a safe place for food, fellowship and enjoyment for seniors. It started with 35 attendees, with a high of 118. Ticket cost is voluntary, made possible by Doris' team of volunteers who prepare and serve, decorate, and line up enjoyable entertainment. Current volunteers include Sharon Armstrong, Jayne Barnett, Terri Flegel, Sheila Krippl, Dawn Matthews-Nichols, Linda Best, Brenda Stapleton, Heather Parkinson and Jayne Walker. It is not just their hard work, but also their warmth and grace that is part of the experience. Of course the entire congregation helps when they set up tables and prepare our worship area. And the staff do a lot of the cleanup and other support.

Feedback and attendance demonstrates that Senior's Luncheon is a bi-monthly highlight. For some it's the only regular social outing. For others it's the comfort food, or the connection, or the opportunity to "forget my aches and pains and have a good laugh." For all, as Lane reminded us, growing older is not about being pressured by time or living in denial! It is about being thankful for the time, each moment that is a sheer gift, to bless our Father in Heaven, and enjoy Him and others as we gather.

Long Range Planning Committee Report

First a refresher – after putting Long Range Planning on hold during our recent ministry transition, we decided enough time had passed and enough things changed at Oak Park to update our ministry consultation to ensure the prior draft building modifications were still fully relevant.

Over the past year the LRPC consulted with the staff, Board, Elders and ministries. From that consultation, several adjustments or upgrades to the prior plans were proposed. Major decisions included deferring any sanctuary expansion for the foreseeable future and focusing more on how our church and community ministries could be enhanced with various building improvements.

That feedback was presented to our architect late last spring and LRPC worked with the architect over the summer to incorporate that ministry feedback into the renovation drawings.

At the last LRPC meeting on October 29th we reviewed the architect's updated drawings and decided they are sufficiently developed to check back with the above church groups to ensure their requested ministry needs have been captured.

Over the next few weeks the LRPC will hold follow up meetings with the staff, Board, Elders and the major ministries at Oak Park.

We've also received some cost estimates and are building financial models to determine how to financially manage the building upgrades.

Once we've completed circling back to the above groups and are confident the proposed plans capture our key ministry needs, we'll broaden the communication on those plans with the rest of the congregation – likely in the New Year.


An Update From... pinelake christian camp
